Redenbach Reunion

This file is a scan of parts of an article in the Bairnsdale Advertiser of 11 April 1988, when the Redenbach families held a reunion at Bairnsdale.

More than 200 members of the Redenbach family gathered in Bairnsdale during Easter for a family reunion.

The people were all descendants of the four Redenbach brothers, Karl, Philipp, Jacob and Daniel, who migrated to Australia in 1855.

The brothers emigrated from Bavaria on the ship "Champion of the Seas".

They were all musicians and played at the Melbourne Tivoli Theatre for three months. But the gold-fields were the big attraction and the four travelled these for 20 years, playing their music and fossicking for the elusive yellow metal. They finally settled in

They finally settled in Bairnsdale in 1875.

Philipp bought land near Eagle Point where the Redenbach brothers grew hops.

They also formed a brass band in 1875, and played at many important functions.

Jacob and Daniel took up land at Tambo Upper in 1875, and reared families of eight. Many of their descendants still live in the district. The farm which Jacob owned is still owned by some of his descendants. Jacob died in 1916 and Daniel in 1918.

The land owned by Philipp on the Mitchell River was sold in 1886. It is believed that he also owned a coffee palace in

Bairnsdale.

He later purchased land at Wuk Wuk where he grew tobacco. He had seven children. Philipp died in 1901.

Karl owned land at Wy Yung and died in 1910. He had one son

named Frederick.

There were descendants of all brothers at the reunion, which was held at the Bairnsdale Recreational Centre on Easter Saturday.

They travelled from Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and New Zealand

A feature of the celebrations was a modern edition of the Redenbach's band which played for an evening of dancing.

Three Redenbach family members who often play at such occasions came together to form a band for the evening.
